Transfiguration - Leaders Guide

A creative reflection on the transfiguration of Jesus.

This service was originally created for St James's Piccadilly, London UK, monthly 'Creative Spirit' service, in August 2018 by artist Amy Diana Poole.

The majority of my services also have an adapted version without religious affiliation, however as this service specifically looks at the Transfiguration of Jesus that was not possible on this occasion.

The service is structured with an opening reading, four image stations around the space and a closing reading. I would also recommend having some-kind of background music during the reflection period around the stations.

Introduction to be read by the leader: 5 mins

On the eve of the Transfiguration we gather to immerse ourselves in the famous story of mystical encounter and to consider its meaning for our lives today.

'The sublime' refers to a greatness beyond all possibility of calculation, measurement, or imitation. It is the sensation, when situated within nature of such enormity, beauty and awe, you are at the same time confronted with an overwhelming sense of mortality and our insignificance in the universe.

This feeling is akin to that of meeting God, of being immersed in the presence of an unknowable power.

To reflect on the Transfiguration, there are four meditation stations around the church, take your time to read the instructions, reflect on the images and immerse yourself in God's presence.

1. Reading from Matthew 5 mins

Matthew 17

After six days Jesus took with him Peter, James and John the brother of James, and led them up a high mountain by themselves. 2 There he was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and his clothes became as white as the light. 3 Just then there appeared before them Moses and Elijah, talking with Jesus.

4 Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is good for us to be here. If you wish, I will put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah."

5 While he was still speaking, a bright cloud covered them, and a voice from the cloud said, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased. Listen to him!"

6 When the disciples heard this, they fell facedown to the ground, terrified. 7 But Jesus came and touched them. "Get up," he said. "Don't be afraid." 8 When they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus.

9 As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus instructed them, "Don't tell anyone what you have seen, until the Son of Man has been raised from the dead."

10 The disciples asked him, "Why then do the teachers of the law say that Elijah must come first?"

11 Jesus replied, "To be sure, Elijah comes and will restore all things. 12 But I tell you, Elijah has already come, and they did not recognize him, but have done to him everything they wished. In the same way the Son of Man is going to suffer at their hands." 13 Then the disciples understood that he was talking to them about John the Baptist.

2. Stations around the church. 30 mins

Using the images found in the links, or those of your own choice, create 4 stations around the space.

The four stations represent:

- 1. The Mountain, where humanity meets God
- 2. Divine glory, light of God
- 3. Voice of God
- 4. Anticipation, of the resurrection, or what is to come

Print the texts, which can be found on the last two pages of this pack, to accompany the matching stations.

2. Closing reading to be read by the leader.
